Then Joseph fell on his father's face, and wept over him, and kissed him. And Joseph commanded his servants the physicians to embalm his father. So the physicians embalmed Israel. Forty days were required for him, for such are the days required for those who are embalmed; and the Egyptians mourned for him seventy days.


Embalming served to preserve the body of the deceased ... The principal agent used in the embalming process is natron, which served to dry out the body after the important viscera (i.e. key internal organs) were removed. This dehydration process took about forty days. The viscera were packed in natron individually and eventually replaced in the body.


Meanwhile, the body was washed out with spiced wine, and after the process was over, it was anointed with oils and gum resins ... the body was wrapped in linen ... As a final step, a liquid resin was poured over the whole body."




Genesis 50:7-9













Genesis 41:51-52




Genesis 42:21-24



So Jacob went down to Egypt; and he died, he and our fathers. And they were carried back to Shechem and laid in the tomb that Abraham bought for a sum of money ...






